ACADEMIC CHALLENGE: Academic Challenge is one of the longest running locally produced shows in television history. The mission of Academic Challenge, where students are the stars of each show, is to shine the spotlight on academic excellence and the importance of education in all of our communities. Each week, students representing schools from all around Northern Ohio use their brains to battle toward the season championship. Three teams compete for points by answering questions covering such topics as math, science, history and current events. ENTREPRENEURSHIP CLUB: The entrepreneurship Club at Benedictine is an exciting program. The entrepreneurship club is part of the Veale Youth Entrepreneurship Forum. The mission of the forum is to enable high school students to recognize their full potential by experiencing all facets of entrepreneurship. The Forum delivers on that purpose through high-value learning experiences and connections to the real-world of entrepreneurship. Funded by The Veale Foundation, the Forum is a growing network of high schools in Northeast Ohio that was founded in 2012 with the assistance of the Young Entrepreneur Institute at University School. The Forum currently reaches some 3,000 students annually at 22 different private and public high schools that are invited for participation and uses its resources to equip students with an entrepreneurial mindset and essential skills. The Forum sponsors annual business and pitch competitions, enabling students to develop ideas, deliver presentations, create business plans, and found new ventures. Student participation in summer internships, entrepreneurship camps, and the Young Entrepreneur Market are also supported. The Forum introduces students and their teachers to Northeast Ohio's entrepreneurial ecosystem, providing students with a network for kick starting their professional lives in a place where entrepreneurs are nurtured and supported. Over the past three years Benedictine has had multiple winners in Pitchfest, the Teen Pitch Tank, and the Veale Venture Challenge. Our students have started and run businesses that have grossed over \$50,000 in sales. Moderator, Mr. Stircula

THE ENVIRONMENTAL CLUB: is a Benedictine organization helping make the world a better place. The Environmental Club is divided into 3 parts, Recycling, Plant Life, and Public Service. Our current recycling consists in collecting the school recyclables and taking them out to the bin in the parking lot. With Plant life we take care of plants throughout the school and make the world greener one plant at a time. We plant plants outside to grow, and the occasional group meeting, or hike through an ecosystem. For Public Service we spread awareness of the planet we call home. JSA allows for an exchange of ideas through stimulating student debates, thought talks, problem solving, and a variety of simulations; by participating in these activities, each member gains a more intelligent and informed viewpoint. JSA also provides a wonderful chance to meet and make friends with scores of other bright, involved students who have similar interests. It's an experience that you don't want to miss. Benedictine's Key Club is sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of Shaker Square. The organization was started by California State Commissioner of Schools Albert C. Olney, and vocational education teacher Frank C. Vincent, who together worked to establish the first Key Club at Sacramento High School in California, on May 7, 1925. Female students were first admitted in 1976, eleven years before women were admitted to the sponsoring organization, Kiwanis International. Moderator, Mr. Gallagher

MUSIC TECHNOLOGY CLUB: 20 state-of-the-art Digital Audio Workstations on MACs. Uses Garageband, and Pro Tools 11. Students explore music through composing, editing, mixing, producing, and performing music. We offer students a chance to express themselves musically by using the Digital Audio Workstations to complete recording, editing, mixing, and producing projects throughout the year. We meet weekly during the first meeting period on Wednesdays. Other topics include: song writing, mastering, synthesis, and sound engineering. PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB: Objective of the club is to take the DSLR camera off point and shoot. We will also put camera in manual mode and explain f-stop, shutter speed and iso settings. In the club we send students to sporting events for our school (mostly Varsity events) and they take video and/or pictures of the games/matches/meets. Afterward, the students are tasked with editing the videos they took to make 2-3 minute highlight films of the game. They are encouraged to find music that matches the feel of the video, to play with different types of transitions, try to use slow-mo, and play with black-and-white versus color shots. Learning to use our HD and 4K video cameras and the video editing programs is an integral part of this club.
