
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Faith During Pandemic

Monks Keep Busy While Staying Safe

Monks are men of routine. They live by a rule written by Saint Benedict in the 6th century. Everyday monks throughout the world get up before dawn and chant praise to God through the psalms and the celebration of the Eucharist. The rest of the monastic day is punctuated by times of work and prayer (Ora et Labora).

So when the monks of Saint Andrew Abbey emerged from the statewide shutdown for the COVID-19 virus in May, they looked ahead to a summer without many of the events they were used to such as the annual alumni reunion, summer classes at John Carroll University, visits to confreres at Regina Health Center, full Masses at weekend parish assignments, community outings, the Slovak pilgrimage in honor of Saints Ann and Joachim in Euclid, and even the festivities in nearby Little Italy for the feast of the Assumption.

Even vacation plans were altered such as the inability for Brother Gabriel Balazovic, OSB to visit his relatives in Toronto with Brother Peter Ancell, OSB. And, Fr. Michael Brunovsky, OSB sadly watched a pilgrimage to Europe with his priest brother Fr. Steven Brunovsky of St. Hilary's Parish in Fairlawn cancelled. But monks are also good at practicing detachment and adapting to new circumstances. Fr. Michael organized a three-day drive with new abbey postulant Seamus Coyne and Fr. Gerard Gonda, OSB '71 in July to the "Land of the Cross-Tipped Churches" in western Ohio. This unique spot in the state is overwhelmingly Catholic. Faith-filled German Catholic immigrant farmers 160 years ago in Auglaize and Mercer counties built churches every five miles to make sure they would be able to attend Mass in bad weather. The monks visited 32 of the 35 churches which are always open to visitors and pilgrims. They are all active parishes with good weekly attendance and in beautiful condition....

Fr. Michael on a Mission of Beauty

If you ever visit Benedictine's campus, a familiar sight is to see Fr. Michael Brunovsky, OSB in his 2004 Benedictine State Championship hat, trimming the many hedges that line Benedictine's walkways and roadways, maintaining the abbey gardens, and generally keeping things beautiful!

For anyone fortunate enough to see the abbey courtyard, the brilliant blue planter right in the middle is certainly eye catching. When asked about it, in true Fr. Michael fashion, he is able to tell you the history of that planter as he knows it.

"It's been here for a long time, at least as long as I've been here. It was cast by some company in Dayton, Ohio, but doesn't say the year!" he exclaims, wishing he knew. "There's a little plate on the bottom and when we were able to get the stuff off of it, we could read it. It has got to be over 100 years old."

"It's cast iron, with about seven coats of paint and the rust was coming through. So I said, during the winter time, I'm going to redo it. I started that particular project with paint remover and that took all winter long, off and on, to get to the base. So we got it down, and Seamus Coyne, the postulant, was very helpful with that. You have to grind the stuff off, so we got it down as close to the original metal as possible. Then, we primed it, and then we used the blue Rust-Oleum."

"Some people ask me, why that shade of blue? Well, last summer I was in Russia and Russians like bright colors like that and that's partly because the growing season is so short there. In October it's already snowing. That blue is all over the place and gold is on a lot of church roofs. If you go to the top of Broadview Hill, you'll see St. Sergius Russian Orthodox Church with its blue dome with gold stars which symbolize the Blessed Mother. So that's the reason why those colors are there."

Fr. Michael can tell you about the plants all over the grounds at Benedictine. He is especially excited about the flowers in front of the walkway to the Abbey Church.

"These are begonias, and I love begonias because they do well in direct sun. We've got red, with a copper leaf, and then white and pink with a green leaf, which makes a beautiful contrast."

"Then, we've got hydrangeas, otherwise known as a snowball bush, and then these are some of my favorites, these are called vincas and this magenta color is just eye popping, I just love it."

"The begonias I have to plant every year and this year I have them planted in a striated form, so when they grow big and form one bush, it'll look like neapolitan ice cream."

Fr. Michael also has some plans to create a tiered garden behind the Marian grotto.

Fr. Michael has always been involved in the landscaping, but has taken a more active role in the last five years in maintaining and developing the grounds at Benedictine. Fr. Michael revealed that he and his brother Steven (now pastor of St. Hilary's Parish in Fairlawn) learned gardening while helping their father Paul Brunovsky with their family vegetable garden. Fr. Michael has long range plans for his campus flowerbeds. After all, his father still maintains a garden and he just celebrated his 90th birthday this month.

If you haven't been back to 2900 MLK Jr. Dr. recently, our hallways are adorned with the Benedictine Hallmarks. Words like "Hospitality," "Prayer," and "Humility" hang from the ceiling as reminders for our young men of the cornerstones of a 1,500 year tradition of education. Amidst the confusion and uncertainty unleashed by COVID-19 last March, the Hallmark of "Listening" was critical when it came to our planning and execution of the remainder of the second semester. For 93 years, Benedictine High School has delivered a top-flight education to over 10,000 young men in the Greater Cleveland area in-person. But for the first time, our faculty and staff were charged with the task of delivering instruction in a remote fashion.

In under 18 hours, we

It was not perfect, but what it did was provide some semblance of certainty where there was none. We modeled for our young men what critical thinkers do when presented with obstacles. But most importantly, we deepened our sense of community at a time when many were faced with loneliness, detachment, and a longing to be together. We know now more than ever that if we can persevere in these conditions, we can continue to employ our unique blend of grit and grace to accomplish great things together. None of our success would have been possible, our goals could not have been clearly defined and achieved, if we had skipped that essential step of listening.

For those who are graduates and grew up with BHS, we're still listening to hear how you and your families are doing. For those who are just joining us, we're listening to hear your fresh and creative suggestions on how we can best evolve as a community to most effectively and compassionately meet the ever changing needs of our young men. Remaining in the Neighborhood – the Decision of 1979

It began on a Sunday morning in August. Two social communities in the Buckeye neighborhood of Cleveland had been slinging verbal insults at each other for weeks. Finally, a pistol was brandished and police were called from their nearby district headquarters to disperse the crowd before anyone was seriously injured. The police remained on high alert for the rest of the month after several more riots broke out.


Are we talking about the 2020 "Summer of Discontent" that originated with the shocking death of George Floyd in Minneapolis and which soon spread riots throughout the country with the theme of racism? No, the riots described above took place in the Buckeye neighborhood in Cleveland in the summer of 1891 as Slovak and Hungarian immigrants verbally and physically fought over control of St. Ladislaus Church on Holton Avenue. Hard feelings carried over the ocean from national hostilities in Europe.

Thirty years later in 1922, Slovak Benedictine monks from Chicago arrived in Cleveland to establish a secondary school that would move to the Buckeye neighborhood five years later to serve the sons of Slovak immigrants. However, from the day it opened its doors in 1927, Benedictine High School reflected the Benedictine Hallmark of Hospitality and welcomed students of all nationalities and races. Ironically, the first graduate to receive a diploma in the first graduation class in 1931 was Hungarian -Edward Bartko from St. Elizabeth's Parish – who actually spoke at the 2002 BHS Commencement Ceremony at St. John's Cathedral.

Very early in its 93-year history, Benedictine High School was racially integrated. In 1934, Robert Derritt became the first African-American student to enroll and graduate from BHS. He ranked academically 8th out of his class of 32 students in 1938. Two years later, Stanford Berry and his brother Leon would enroll from Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament Elementary School. Stanford became a U.S. Customs Inspector and Leon went on to a become a professional singer who several times performed at Carnegie Hall in New York City.

Yet, until the late 1960s when "white flight" hit the City of Cleveland and especially the Buckeye neighborhood, Benedictine High School, though racially integrated, claimed a majority white student population with many coming from nearby Slovak, Hungarian, and Italian parish schools. However, panic set in when the total enrollment suddenly dropped from 914 in 1966 to 402 a decade later in 1976. The Hough riots in 1966 caused many ethnic neighborhoods in Cleveland to collapse along with their parish schools.

Many BHS alumni and benefactors urged the monks to move the high school and monastery to the suburbs which were growing with the influx of white families fleeing the riot-torn city. There was even a division of opinion within the monastic community with fears that the high school would be forced to close if the enrollment continued to fall.

A headline for a story in the Cleveland Press on April 16, 1975 read "Benedictine to remain open with enrollment and cash woes." The adjacent photo and story was about long-time rival Cathedral Latin High School on East 107th Street. At a meeting attended by 500 parents and students, the Cathedral Latin school president announced that the Marianist religious order had decided to close the school because of a similar drop in enrollment.

Abbot Jerome Koval, OSB was quoted in the Benedictine story as stating that BHS would not close, "If we run into a financial squeeze our men (the 25 teaching monks at the time) may have to make a bigger sacrifice than they make already." Principal Fr. Roger Gries, OSB '54, said in the same article, "There is no question of us moving.....we will just have to find more students because it's unlikely that parents can pay much more than the \$600 a year tuition."

Benedictine did find more students by expanding bus service from one route in the eastern suburbs to nine routes by 1980. Fr. Norbert Ozimek, OSB learned to repair the buses and vans to save money and was also named Recruitment Director. The enrollment began to grow by 1977 when it reached 460 students.

Ironically, Benedictine saved its life by promoting racial integration facilitated by voluntary busing at the exact time that court-ordered racial desegregation of public schools by forced busing was ordered in major cities in the United States. In the 1970s, forced busing of public school students started with Boston and reached Cleveland by 1979 amid great controversy and often violence. Yet, at exactly the same time, white suburban students started freely coming into the city on buses to attend a racially integrated Benedictine. With God all things are possible!

Abbot Jerome called the monastic community to commit to a year of prayerful discernment in 1978 concerning the question of whether the abbey and high school should move to a suburban location. In addition to special prayers, community discussions took place during that year, some with outside presenters.

At the annual celebration of the feast of Saint Benedict, on March 21, 1979, in the presence of Cleveland Bishop James Hickey and over 200 priests, Abbot Jerome announced that the Benedictines would remain in the Buckeye neighborhood as a sign of the special Benedictine vow of Stability. He also pointed out that the monks saw a sign of God's will in the steady increase in enrollment for BHS over the past five years to a high of 505 students with 186 freshmen.

And while 15 other Benedictine monasteries experienced declines in membership as high as 40% between 1966 and 1976, Saint Andrew Abbey actually grew from 64 monks in 1966 to 65 monks in 1976 despite 11 deaths during that decade. This was also considered a sign.

A new mission statement for BHS released that day stated, "We believe that by committing ourselves, within the City of Cleveland and Diocese of Cleveland, to the education of young

men who demonstrate the desire and academic potential for college studies, Benedictine High School will provide experiences which will heighten the awareness of these young men in the areas of community stability, social justice, cultural diversity, and evangelization while respecting and acknowledging religious diversity."

Four decades later, that prophetic decision in 1979 still finds the Home of Champions open and working effectively to help students of different races, ethnicities, economic levels, and neighborhoods to recognize that they are all children of God. It is not an easy task and over the years there have been tensions, but overall Benedictine has become known as a welcoming community, and an island of understanding in a city often torn by division and fear. And with God's continued help and the support of alumni and friends, this miracle can endure.



On February 5, 1922, Fr. Stanislaus Gmuca, OSB, a Benedictine monk of St. Procopius Abbey in Chicago, arrived in Cleveland and was installed as pastor of St. Andrew's Parish on Superior Avenue and East 52nd Street. By the end of the year two more Benedictine priests, Fr. Celestine Drexler, OSB, and Fr. Leo Rehak, OSB, would be sent from St. Procopius Abbey to assist Fr. Stanislaus. The actual originator of the idea of a Slovak Benedictine monastery in Cleveland, Fr. Gregory Vaniscak, OSB, would not be able to come from Chicago until 1928.

This was the first step in the establishment of St. Andrew Abbey as an independent monastery dedicated to the pastoral care of Slovak immigrants in Cleveland. In 1924, Fr. George Luba, OSB, would arrive and begin planning the opening of Benedictine High School in 1927.

Thus the year 2022 will mark the 100th anniversary of the arrival of the first Benedictine monks in Cleveland. Looking ahead in 2016, the Board of Trustees of Benedictine High School and the monks of St. Andrew Abbey began planning for an appropriate and prudent way to both celebrate the accomplishments of the past century and to look with confidence to the future.

A strategic plan was developed based on the Benedictine Hallmarks of Hospitality, Stewardship, Conversion of Life, Stability, and Love of Christ and Neighbor. This was followed by a professionally-directed feasibility study and the formation of a Steering Committee to launch The Benedictine Centennial Campaign: A Present and Future Community of Faith.

Additional input from stakeholders and modifications to this strategic plan followed until a final multi-phase plan for the future was finalized. The first phase includes these major goals:

- Unifying the abbey and the high school in a tangible way through the creation of a landscaped courtyard that would extend the natural beauty of the beloved 1954 Marian grotto replacing the faculty parking lot, and bordered by the science building, the Trueman
 - Fieldhouse, the abbey church, and the main classroom building.
- The upgrading of all current facilities including the replacement of the roof of the abbey church which was built in 1984, the construction of a new entrance to BHS which would face the large parking lot uniting the main classroom building and the science building, and modernization of the science labs and cafeteria which also date to 1984.

After these goals are met, attention will be given to strengthening the funding available for the health care and education of the monks of the abbey and strengthening the student tuition scholarship endowment.

"In the past century, the Benedictine Order of Cleveland and Benedictine High School have only had four capital improvement campaigns: in 1961 for the new gymnasium, in 1984 for the new abbey guest wing and church and science labs, in 2001 for the remodeling of all the classrooms and growth of the BHS endowment, and in 2009 for the construction of the Bossu Athletic Field. In other words, we have been prudent with the generosity of our many friends and alumni," explained

As faculty and students returned in late August after the summer break and prior three month Covid-19 shutdown, preparations were underway for the transformation of the faculty parking lot behind the main classroom building into a college-like green

> courtyard dedicated to the memory of the late coach, athletic director and teacher, Joe Rufus, who arrived at Benedictine in 1945 and transformed the sports program, setting the bar high with a championship spirit that would carry through the next 75 years to the present. The new landscaped mall will include a special elevated gathering area for special presentations and alumni events. A memorial to Joe Rufus will be located there. Mr. Rufus retired in 1987 and passed away in 1996.

"As Benedictines," Abbot Gary reflected, "we are called to be stewards of God's beautiful earth. The Rufus Courtyard with its natural landscaping unites the abbey and school in a setting that will provide peace and tranquility for the monks, students, staff and really for all who enter this special space. It will unite and introduce one to the grotto area, a sacred space with the statue of our Blessed Virgin Mary, the patroness of Benedictine High School."

Approximately \$2.8 million of the \$4 million initial phase of *The* Benedictine Centennial Campaign has already been raised in cash and pledges. The courtyard renovation should be completed during this school year and in the spring ground should be broken for the new entrance atrium structure that will connect the main classroom building to the science building.

The Centennial Campaign

When the current main building was opened in 1940, most students walked to school or took a city bus which would drop them off in front of the school. In those days, the front doors under the entrance arch were used to enter and exit the building. Later, in the 1960s as students were dropped off in the abbey circle by their parents, the side entrance doors along the main driveway provided a popular entrance location. But in recent decades, as more and more students drive to school, the corner back door leading to the large parking lot has become the real entrance for most students and visitors.

Benedictine's president and principal, Mr. Ryan Ryzner '95, observed, "Not only will this new entrance improve our campus aesthetically, but it will also serve as an additional area for student and staff collaboration. Additionally, it will allow us to hold moderate-sized social events and gatherings. Finally, it will assist us in providing a warm and safe welcome to all those who enter our building."

Much has transpired in the area of science and technology since the current BHS science labs were installed as part of the 1984 capital campaign. The Centennial Campaign will renovate and update all the science department classrooms and labs to meet current and future standards for science curriculum incorporating technology and data analysis. These needed improvements will augment the contemporary emphasis on

science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) that have caused more students to pursue these careers.

The highest structure on the Benedictine campus since 1986 has been the dramatic, slanted roof of the abbey church crowned with the distinctive arched belfry. This dominant edifice symbolizes that the primary mission of both the abbey and the high school is to give glory to God. Yet, because its initial design included skylight windows, the abbey church roof has been plagued with periodic leaks over the past four decades. Continued patching has been the temporary solution. The replacement of the roof has become a priority capital project for the abbey.

The Centennial Campaign: A Present and Future Community of Faith invites your participation to help the Cleveland Benedictines, as well as our current students and future Men of Benedictine prepare for their second century of prayer and work. Vice-President of Institutional Advancement Mr. Christopher Lorber '04 points out that "The vision for the near future has been extremely exciting to strategically plan and assist to develop with our steering committee. 

In Memoriam

of Benedictine High School and friends of Saint Andrew Abbey



Leo (Choo-Choo) Minter '52, 87, was a pioneering halfback as the first African-American football player at Benedictine who helped engineer the Bengals drive toward the East Senate Co-Championship in the 1951 football season. Minter died in Cleveland on July 4, 2020.

He was inducted into the Benedictine Athletic Hall of Fame on April 30, 2000. In part, his Hall of Fame plaque reads: "The small but mighty Minter (5-6, 145 pounds) holds the distinction of being the first Black football player at Benedictine." Finishing his career with 72 points on 12 touchdowns, Minter was tied for fifth place on the all-time scoring list at the time of his graduation.

At the time of his Benedictine Hall of Fame induction, Minter was a member of St. Wenceslas Church in Maple Heights and a member of the Knights of Columbus. Leo's son, Michael (Benedictine Class of 1972), was a halfback on the Bengals last two Cleveland City Championship teams in 1970 and 1971.




Steve Palenchar '56, BHS Hall of Famer, died May 10, 2020 in Sacramento, California. Nicknamed "The Rock," Palenchar was a tough, hard-hitting linebacker, Steve was a member of the 1955 Bengals that had a 9-0 season capped by a resounding 47-6 victory over St. Ignatius in the annual Charity Game before a crowd of

21,029. Steve went on to star at the University of Dayton where he earned national honors and served as team captain. He returned to teach and coach at BHS in the early 1960s and took similar jobs at a number of high schools in Ohio and Florida until retiring from teaching in 1976.



Rick Kestner '61, 77, passed away July 16, 2020 at his residence in Concord Township. He was the captain and played guard and linebacker on the 1960 Bengals football team that should be considered as one of the toughest in Benedictine history. He was inducted into the Benedictine Athletic Hall of Fame in 2009. Rick and his

brother Ken '56 are one of only a few brother combinations who are members of the Benedictine Athletic Hall of Fame. In addition, his brother Jim is a 1959 BHS grad and his nephew Art Kestner is a 1969 Bengals grad. He had the distinction of being named Most Valuable Player of the 1960 city championship Charity Game even though Benedictine lost 6-0 to John Marshall before 31,545 fans at the stadium. Kestner earned his bachelor's degrees and master's degrees and made education his career as a teacher.



Fr. John Bryk, 92, of the Class of 1946 passed away on August 16, 2020. He was ordained a priest of the Diocese of Cleveland in 1953 and served as pastor of St. Casimir's Parish (1971-73) and later as pastor of St. Hedwig's Parish (1973 – 2007). From 1982-86 he was the National Chaplain of the Union of Poles of America.




Lois St. John, 82, died November 26, 2019. She was the wife of Chuck '54 for 63 years and mother of Tom '75, Chris '77, Bill '78, Mary Ellen, Julie Ann, Sue, Eddie '84, and Tony '86 and grandmother of Colin '09, Nick '09, and Ben '11. She was the



Whether assisting Chuck with the operation of the family funeral business or volunteering for countless BHS Parent-Boosters Club events, Lois always provided quiet, yet cheerful support.

Lois was the manager of the Benedictine Bookstore in the 1980s. In 1998 when Chuck was inducted to the Benedictine Hall of Honors, Lois was presented with a plaque naming her as the first and only "Honorary Alumna" of BHS. She gave a genuine witness of her Catholic faith and values to her children and grandchildren. providing social events for the swimmers and their parents over the years. She was buried from St. John of the Cross Parish in Richmond Heights.



Rose Sevcik, 93, died on June 22, 2020 and Abbot Gary celebrated her funeral Mass in Saint Andrew Abbey Church. She was the widow of the late Joseph Sevcik of the Class of 1945, sister-in-law of the late Fr. Lawrence Sevcik, OSB '44, and mother of Roseann and Susan. Susan worked as the receptionist at the abbey from 1970 to 2002, a total of 32 years.



Lt. Col.(retired) Edward Szeman, 80, of the Class of 1957 died August 2, 2020 at his home in Harker Heights, Texas. In college, he served as drum major of the Dayton Flyer Marching Band. He taught music to countless elementary school students and performed in local music groups. He served as an armor officer with multiple combat commands in the

Coach Dan O'Shaughnessy (1942-2020)

The Benedictine Family lost one of its legendary figures when former long-time teacher and coach Dan O'Shaughnessy died on Wednesday, April 29, 2020 from complications of the coronavirus which he caught while in rehabilitation for an unrelated infection that had been successfully treated earlier.

Dan was a member of the BHS Class of 1961 of which he was also elected to the highest honor of "Mr. Benedictine." His favorite sport at Benedictine was basketball. As a Bengal athlete, O'Shaughnessy had a career-high game of 19 points in a win over John Hay as a senior. He also reached 16 points three times in his career (vs. Glenville in the 1959-60 season and vs. Glenville and St. Ignatius in the 1960-61 season).


After graduating from BHS, Dan continued his education at Fenn College (now Cleveland State University). He taught for one year at the former St. Stephen's High School on Cleveland's west side before returning to join the faculty at Benedictine in 1967. He would remain a popular member of the teaching and coaching staff for the next 39 years until his retirement in 2006. He taught algebra, economics, and business law. In 2000, the senior class dedicated their yearbook to him.

Generations of Benedictine athletes first encountered Coach O'Shaughnessy (affectionately known as "Daddy O") when they had him as their coach for freshman football. Dan molded the freshmen teams from 1970 until 1994. For the first decade he was assisted by now retired Cleveland Auxiliary Bishop Roger Gries, OSB '54. Dan was exceptionally good at motivating the freshmen with his "enhanced" stories before the game invoking some actual Bengal legends of the past like "Little Joe" Oriti of the Class of '71 and other characters who were victorious against insurmountable odds.

However, Coach O's first love was basketball and he coached the varsity basketball team at BHS for 19 seasons beginning in 1968-69 until the 1986-87 season. When he stepped down, he had the longest tenure and won more games than any coach in school history. He won 170 games and lost 189 games. Many of those losses came early in his coaching career while the Bengals were playing in the tough East Senate where teams regularly made appearances in the state's basketball final four.

And that's why one of his signature career victories came in his first year as head coach when he led the Bengals to a stunning 91-83 upset victory over East Tech.

O'Shaughnessy's best season came in 1980-81 when the Bengals finished with a 14-6 record. He also had seasons of 13-5 in 1979-80, 13-7 in 1973-74, 12-7 in 1971-72, 12-9 in 1984-85, 11-8 in 1972-73 and in 1978-79.



Benedictine hockey coaches Jim '90 and Bob '91 Kehres were so impressed with Coach O during their time at the school, that they named an award in honor of Coach O. The



award is the Coach Dan O'Shaughnessy Leadership Award which goes to the senior hockey player who demonstrates the qualities of leadership through hard work and an unselfish attitude both on and off the ice.

Coach O'Shaughnessy was a private man who valued and practiced his Catholic faith all his life. He made it a personal practice to attend the funeral Masses of every Benedictine monk who died from St. Andrew's Abbey. He had a personal admiration for the late Fr. Robert Wilkes, OSB for whom an annual award is given to the best BHS business student. For many years, Coach O'Shaughnessy provided an anonymous \$100 stipend to go along with that award.

A lifelong bachelor, Coach O'Shaughnessy is survived by nieces and nephews. Because of the restrictions on churches, a memorial Mass will be planned and announced later. Please remember this dedicated and hard-working Man of Benedictine in your prayers.
