

Saint Andrew Abbey Annual Benefit



On Saturday, September 16th, St. Andrew Abbey celebrated 101 years of Benedictine Monks in Cleveland. After Mass at the Church of the Assumption, everyone gathered at St. Michael's Woodside, dined together, and commemorated the deep roots that the monks had planted when they arrived in 1922.





The honoree of the night was Abbot Gary Hoover, OSB '74, for his ordination into the priesthood 40 years ago. Abbot Gary is well known to the Men of Benedictine. He spent many years as the school chaplain and was on the sidelines for many who passed through the halls of the Home of Champions. For winning teams and for losing teams, Abbot Gary was there as someone who believed in the Men of Benedictine. His presence was a reminder that they should put their faith in God and that God's faith and love was present for them. In addition to Abbot's support of Benedictine High School he is appreciated as a steady spiritual advisor to the monks at St. Andrew Abbey. He was named prior of the abbey in 2008 and was elected as the 7th abbot in 2014.

Abbot Gary has led many retreats over the years and his Kairos and Mountain of God retreats have had a deep impact. Many know that interactions with Abbot can be lighthearted but also confrontational. He doesn't shy away from the deeper questions and the tougher conversations. His phrase, "Go with God and fight with heart" is well known and is often said. Fr. Bob Stec brought up that very phrase when speaking about Abbot Gary as a colleague at St. Ambrose Church and now at St. Colette's Church. Fr. Michael spoke about Abbot Gary the spiritual leader. He reminded those gathered how the election of Abbot is something not done often and is deeply significant. President Dave Schroeder '90 spoke about the impact Abbot Gary had on him as a student and athlete at Benedictine and as someone who married him and his wife, Kathy.

Abbot Gary spoke from the heart and left the podium to a standing ovation. The monks of St. Andrew Abbey ended the night by singing the Benedictine Ultima, a traditional Latin hymn monks sing at interments to marry for a happy death.

Monastic Presence Today at BHS

Chapter 59 of the 6th century “Rule of Saint Benedict” talks about parents who would bring their sons to live in a monastery in exchange for an offering of property, or, if they were poor, without an offering. Some of these boys would stay when they came of age and become monks. Other boys would return to their families having received an education in body, mind, and spirit.

Although Benedictine monks see the witness of community life and liturgy as their primary work in the Church, there have been schools staffed by Benedictine monks for centuries. Since the founding of Benedictine High School in Cleveland in 1927, there have always been monks from Saint Andrew Abbey on the faculty. It is one of our unique attributes that is used by the admissions office when introducing BHS to prospective students.

Nowadays having religious priests, monks, brothers, or nuns on the faculty of a Catholic school is very rare. **In 1960, over 75%** of the teachers in Catholic schools in the United States were religious men or women.

Today, they account for less than 2% of the faculty in Catholic schools. The drastic change is the result of smaller families, a more secular society, more career opportunities, and, sadly, a lack of zeal in living the Catholic faith among younger generations.

On page 8 is a story about seven young Benedictine monks who were ordained on the same day back in 1942 and four of them were recent BHS alumni. All seven joined the BHS faculty. By 1960, it was common for there to be 30 monks and fewer than 10 lay teachers on the yearly school staff. By 1990 that ratio would be reversed.

However, Benedictine High School has been blessed in the present day to still have a vibrant monastic presence that helps maintain a unique Catholic influence in the “Home of Champions.” It is a religious presence unmatched in the other Catholic high schools in the Diocese of Cleveland.

Although Saint Andrew Abbey currently has 21 monks, as compared to 80 monks in 1960, in the course of a typical school day, there is a dedicated group of men in black religious habits who cross through the Rufus Courtyard from the abbey to work in the high school.

ABBOT GARY HOOVER, OSB '74 serves as the chancellor and participates in weekly meetings with the school administration and with a special group called Office of Mission Integration that discusses ways to strengthen the school's Catholic identity and mission. Abbot Gary also continues to personally lead Kairos retreats for students and to celebrate Mass periodically for the student body. The abbot is also a member of the BHS Board of Trustees.

FR. ANSELM ZUPKA, OSB '58 has been walking over to the school from the abbey to teach since the mid-1960s, longer than any monk in the history of Benedictine High School. Fr. Anselm, at age 83, continues to teach the German language classes, celebrates a weekly Mass, and organizes popular field trips with the German Club.

FR. MICHAEL BRUNOVSKY, OSB, although not a BHS alumnus, continues to serve BHS in many ways since joining the faculty full time after his ordination in 1993. He remains active in the classroom teaching AP European and U.S. History and a popular elective course in calligraphy. Fr. Michael directs the annual Bike Retreats and Living with Benedict retreat experience. He works with the Pro-Life Club and serves on the Catholic Identity Council and the Board of Trustees.

FR. BEDE KOTLINSKI, OSB, joined the abbey from Columbus, Ohio and for the last three decades has anchored the Classical Language department at Benedictine. Fr. Bede also works with the student altar servers and is moderator of the Latin Club.

FR. FINBAR RAMSAK, OSB, an alumnus of St. Ignatius High School, is now in his 13th year teaching freshman theology at Benedictine. He also serves on the BHS Board of Trustees.

FR. THOMAS SANDERS, OSB, an alumnus from Brookside High School in Sheffield Lake, became the full time campus minister at Benedictine High School this year. In this capacity he regularly meets with a student advisory committee planning religious activities and liturgies for the student body. Fr. Thomas also organizes an annual retreat for the faculty and staff. He also offers organ lessons to interested students and promotes vocation discernment for monastic life.

BRO. GREGORY COYNE, OSB, 29, who only joined the monastic community three years ago, has already become involved with the students at Benedictine through his work assisting with retreats, the Pro-Life Club, and vocations.

Finally, though not officially part of the high school staff, **Brothers Gabriel Balazovic, OSB and Simon Corrigan, OSB** impact the school community by their involvement in campus security and hospitality.

Although the number of black robes on campus is smaller than it was six decades ago, the Home of Champions is blessed by real Benedictine monks who work and pray with our students on a daily basis.

A Record Seven New Priests were Ordained for the Abbey in 1942

The February 27, 1942 issue of the BHS student newspaper, **The Benedictine** (later *The Bennet*), featured a banner headline that read “Liturgical Rites Elevate Seven Young Clerics to Sacred Priesthood.” Below that headline were the pictures of the seven new Benedictine priests who were being ordained that very day by Cleveland **Auxiliary Bishop James McFadden**. History was made because it was the largest number of monks of the abbey ever ordained on the same day. Four times in the 100 year history of the abbey three monks were ordained on the same day.

Of the seven newly-ordained in 1942, four were alumni of BHS: **Fr. Thomas (John) Podobnik, OSB '31** (first graduation class); **Fr. Louis (Andrew) Hudak, OSB '32**; **Fr. Maurus (John) Maruskin, OSB '32** and **Fr. Matthew (Anthony) Bonk, OSB '33**; **Fr. Edward (Joseph) Yatsko, OSB** and **Fr. Augustine (George) Yurko, OSB** were graduates of Chaney High School in Youngstown, while **Fr. Method (Stephen) Granchie, OSB** attended South High in Youngstown.

The first of the “Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit” (at they were affectionately called in the abbey) to die was **Fr. Method** who died on November 27, 1963. He was only 49 years old. The last of the seven to pass away was **Fr. Matthew**, who died on November 9, 1996 at the age of 82. After the premature death of Fr. Method, the remaining six classmates were able to celebrate together the 25th anniversary of their ordination at BHS in 1967 as well as their 40th priestly jubilee in 1982. And the only surviving member of the 1942 class to reach his Golden Jubilee of priesthood in 1994 was **Fr. Matthew**.



**Accomplishments and Community**

Sean is humble about his long list of accomplishments, but his mom, Deanna, helped us fill in the blanks. Beyond his academic achievements as a Howley Aspire Nurse Scholar, Peck Scholar, Honor Roll recipient and band leader, he is Benedictine's first ever Thrive Scholar. "As a Thrive Scholar, Sean challenged himself to get out of his comfort zone. This was his first time away from home by himself for an extended period of time and this was his first time traveling on an airplane. He describes his experience as a Thrive Scholar as 'amazing!' He enjoyed studying college math and writing courses at Amherst College in Amherst, Massachusetts," Deanna shared.

Outside of school, Sean cares for his community through a number of service projects, including volunteering at the Greater Cleveland Food Bank, supporting The City Mission, donating school supplies to a local church, and donating toys to a local child care center. Last year, Sean was the President of the youth group, Gamma Rho chapter, for the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc. (an organization for educators, of which his mother is a member). He was recognized for his leadership at the 62nd Annual Youth Leadership Conference in April 2023, at the Marriott East Hotel in Beachwood, Ohio. Also, during this conference, he won a regional creative writing award for a poem that he wrote using the theme, "Time Marches On."

One memory Sean will cherish after graduation is the Little Italy parades. He loves that the band has this annual opportunity to march, play music and meet other school band members. His favorite part? Indulging in Little Italy pizza, pasta and gelato.

Sean wants to encourage all students to step outside their comfort zones and take full advantage of the special programs offered at Benedictine.

GOLF



Benedictine High School is indeed a great place to be during these times of exciting change. With the recent campus improvements and the development of our faculty and staff, we are running towards our centennial and focused on growing Benedictine for the next 100 years.

With the average cost of a college credit hour in Ohio at \$336, a student who graduates with 20 CCP credits can save over \$6,500.

While many schools offer CCP courses, Benedictine has the distinction of adjunct professors on campus so students can earn those college credits through their normal course work and not have to go offsite.

ACADEMICS & ARTS



Fine Arts, encompassing visual arts, music, drama, and dance, plays a vital role in nurturing well-rounded individuals, fostering creativity, and building essential life skills. With so much emphasis on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math), the arts are often overlooked. At Benedictine, we are blessed to have the creativity of Fine Arts Department Chair Elizabeth Backowski. Through varied programs, techniques, and forms she continues to focus on cultivating creativity, enhancing critical thinking, creating cultural awareness and diversity, and building confidence through self expression.

Many Fine Arts experiences, such as theatrical productions and musical ensembles, require collaboration and teamwork. Learning to work harmoniously with others towards a common artistic goal instills important interpersonal skills. These experiences teach students the significance of collective effort, compromise, and effective communication—skills that are invaluable in both personal and professional realms.

How many people can say they created a significant and meaningful turnaround in just three years time? Benedictine Music Director Hannah Westfield has done exactly that and she's not stopping any time soon.

When Hannah joined CBHS in 2021, the marching band had just nine members and the theater program had dissolved, so she was excited to come in and help rebuild something great. She came from a small town high school in rural Ohio that only had 12 band members so she knew first hand what it felt like to be in awe of larger programs with greater resources. It was that experience that inspired her to pursue music as a career.

Hannah is a University of Akron graduate with a music education degree. Prior to joining Benedictine, she taught middle school for four years. When Covid had a negative impact on their band, she sought to try something new, ironically at the same time we had an opening. Not only is she leading the band, but she teaches Music Technology, Music History and Music Theory, while also moderating the drama club.

She was anxious to build up the team, instill confidence in the musicians, and give fans a great musical experience. By partnering with Beaumont for majorettes and instrumentalists, she more than quadrupled the size for this year and is ecstatic with the progress. She led fundraising efforts to purchase new uniforms and worked with the team to offer music scholarships. While she anticipated needing several years to replace the uniforms, a kind donor stepped up and provided the funding sooner.

The impact of Hannah's efforts has created a better sense of community and family for the members. We may be small, but we are mighty and she often receives compliments from complete strangers. She can see that the students work hard and truly care about what they do, which positively impacts how they play. Impressive sound for the size of the group.



ACADEMICS

These are just some of the expanded educational programs that help students succeed academically and professionally.

THRIVE SCHOLARS PROGRAM

Thrive is designed for high achieving students of color from low-income backgrounds. The program is entirely free, including flights, housing, meals, and classes. During the program, students attend two residential summer programs for six weeks each, at the colleges of their choosing. They receive coaching on college prep and admissions, 1:1 advising, career development, mentorship, and specialized pathways to careers. After completing the six-year program, students receive support for a graduate program or have access to an alumni career coach. The program is highly selective, only accepting two students per school per year.

ASPIRE PROGRAM

The pre-nursing program offered in partnership with Ursuline School of Nursing is an excellent opportunity for students who are interested in pursuing a career in nursing. This year-long program allows students to explore the nursing field by shadowing at the world-renowned Cleveland Clinic. By participating in this program, students can gain valuable experience and insight into the nursing profession, which can help them make an informed decision about their career path.

HOBY - HUGH O'BRIEN YOUTH LEADERSHIP

Hugh O'Brien Youth Leadership is a 5-day leadership conference in June for sophomores in Ohio. The experience includes seminars, leadership development, speakers, socialization, idea sharing, and dorm life. An added benefit is access to a network of HOBY Alumni afterwards. This year Benedictine is sending Uchenna Njoku, Micah Smith and Patrick Shea from the Class of 2026. is a 5-day leadership conference in June for sophomores in Ohio. ROBOBOTS

Robobots is in its fourth year at Benedictine. Currently we partner with Truline Industries in Wickliffe and are supported by three techs who volunteer their time to meet weekly with students. The team spends the fall designing their robot and winter assembling it in preparation for competition in April hosted by Lakeland Community College. Students also take field trips to tour the Truline facility and learn how parts are manufactured. From drawing up blueprints to assembly of their robot, this is a highly interactive experience of the whole engineering process end to end. In preparation for the tournament, the students must provide thorough documentation on their process as well as participate in a panel interview. The whole experience mimics the real world experiences of manufacturing and engineering.

MAKERSPACE

Makerspace offers hands-on machine work with 3D printing and laser etching. This is Mr. Traben's first year teaching a Tri C level 3D modeling class with laser etching equipment. The intention is to create more opportunities with additional equipment in the future.

MOTOGO

Under the leadership of Mr. Traben, we are the first all-boys high school to offer Motogo to our students. The team is supported by an outside organization that sends mechanic instructors to help students disassemble and reassemble a motorcycle engine. Students love the hands-on experience which sparks confidence and builds problem solving skills. At the end of the year the students mount their engine to a motorcycle and enjoy a kick start graduation. The club is akin to a trade school program preparing young men for potential employment.

ENGINEERING CLUB

This very popular club is offered twice a month and averages 30-60 students. They participate in small group challenges by using a kit of supplies to compete in accomplishing a goal. Ex: newspaper, tape and pipe cleaners to build a structure that can support a basketball. Students also take field trips and enjoy guest speakers.


